CAPE BRETON and the Jackson Kith and Kin is mainly the story of the Loyalists, disbanded soldiers, and other venturesome British subjects who, between 1784 and 1800, settled the fertile lands around Sydney Harbour and other coastal areas of Cape Breton Island, Nova Scotia.

Written mainly from primary sources of information, in addition to a history of the island's early settlement at the time of the Napoleonic Wars when danger from the enemy abroad was as much a threat as hunger, **CAPE BRETON and the Jackson Kith and Kin** brings to light many hitherto unpublished incidents in the lives of the pioneers, accounts of buried treasure and shipwreck, and builds a picture of all phases of 19th-century life on this island.

Miss Elva E. Jackson, who has lived at North Sydney, Nova Scotia all her life, was on the town's teaching staff for thirty-five years and held teaching and administrative positions until her retirement in 1968.
