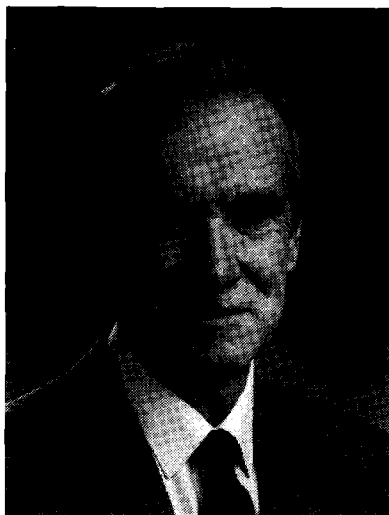

## H. BLAIR NEATBY



*Professor H. Blair Neatby was born in Saskatoon, Saskatchewan and educated at the University of Saskatchewan, Oxford, and the University of Toronto. He has taught at Prince of Wales College, Charlottetown, at the University of British Columbia, and at Carleton University, where he is currently a professor in the Department of History. He has served the Canadian Historical Association in a number of ways, including most recently as chairman of the Garneau Prize Committee. His major publications include William Lyon Mackenzie King: The Lonely Heights 1924-1932 (1963); The Politics of Chaos: Canada in the Thirties (1972); Laurier and a Liberal Québec: A Study in Political Management (1974); and William Lyon Mackenzie King: The Prism of Unity 1932-1939 (1976). His current field of research and publication is the history of higher education.*
