CALLS FOR PAPERS

The 17th Conference on the Application of Quantitative Methods in Canadian Economic History will be held at Queen's University in Kingston, 9-10 November 1990. The conference seeks to encourage the use of a wide range of quantitative and theoretical methods in Canadian economic history. Participants will present and discuss papers or work in progress. Those who wish to contribute a paper or report on their current research are asked to submit a brief abstract of the proposed paper and a copy of their CV. Graduate students are encouraged to participate. The deadline for abstracts is 1 June 1990. The Atlantic Canada Workshop will hold a work shop on community level social relations, in Lunenburg, Nova Scotia, 27-29 September 1990. The workshop is intended as an interdisciplinary forum for discussion of ongoing research. The ACW invites proposals for papers dealing with methodology, preliminary findings, research suggesting the need for new conceptualizations, and work that would benefit from interdisciplinary consideration. CONFERENCE

A LABOUR HISTORY CONFERENCE is being planned for Labour Weekend, 20-21 October 1990. It will be held at Victoria University, Wellington, New Zealand and will be based on the broad theme of "Culture and the Labour Movement." It is hoped that several overseas speakers will give presentations.

By "culture" is meant the many ways that the labour movement reproduces and communicates its ideas, values and experiences over time. This includes poems, ballads and songs; visual representations such as banners, paintings, cartoons and photographs; printed material such as newspapers and periodicals; Labour festivals such as Labour Day and May Day; and the experience of work and its associated cultural forms, distinctive language, patterns of association and community.

The Conference will form part of wider events planned for Wellington over Labour Weekend, 1990. These include the launching of Stevan Eldred-Grigg's *Illustrated History of the Working Class*, an exhibition of trade union art at the City Art Gallery, and the possible re-enactment of the 1890 Labour Day march.
