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A member of the Department of History at the University of North Carolina at Greensboro, Robert M. Calhoun is the author of a forthcoming book, *The Loyalists in Revolutionary America, 1760-1781*. Different versions of his paper were read at a meeting of the Southern Historical Association at Louisville, Kentucky, 12 November 1970, and at the Loyalist Studies Symposium at the University of New Brunswick, 14 October 1972.

A previous contributor to *Acadiensis*, Judith Fingard is a member of the Department of History at Dalhousie University and author of *The Anglican Design in Loyalist Nova Scotia, 1783-1816*.

Neil MacKinnon, a member of the History Department at St. Francis Xavier University, is currently completing his Ph.D. thesis on Nova Scotian Loyalists for Queen's University. An earlier version of his paper was given at the Loyalist Studies Symposium at the University of New Brunswick.

A graduate of the University of Toronto, Richard A. Jarrell currently teaches at Atkinson College and is preparing a book on the history of Canadian astronomy.

A member of the Department of History of Carleton University, Naomi Griffiths has published *The Acadian Deportation: Deliberate Perfidy or Cruel Necessity?* and *The Acadians: Creation of a People*.

W.L. Morton, a member of the History Department of Trent University, has published many books and articles dealing with Canadian history, including *The Kingdom of Canada, The Progressive Party, The Critical Years: The Union of British North America, 1857-1873 Manitoba: A History and One University: A History of the University of Manitoba*. He is also the Executive Editor of *The Canadian Centenary Series*.

A Professor of history at McMaster University, Professor Goldwin S. French has recently become President of Victoria University, Toronto. He is the author of *Parsons and Politics: The role of the Wesleyan Methodists in Upper Canada and the Maritimes from 1780 to 1855*.

A member of the History Department of the University of New Brunswick, W. Stewart MacNutt is Chairman of the Canadian Committee of the Programme for Loyalist Studies and Publications.
