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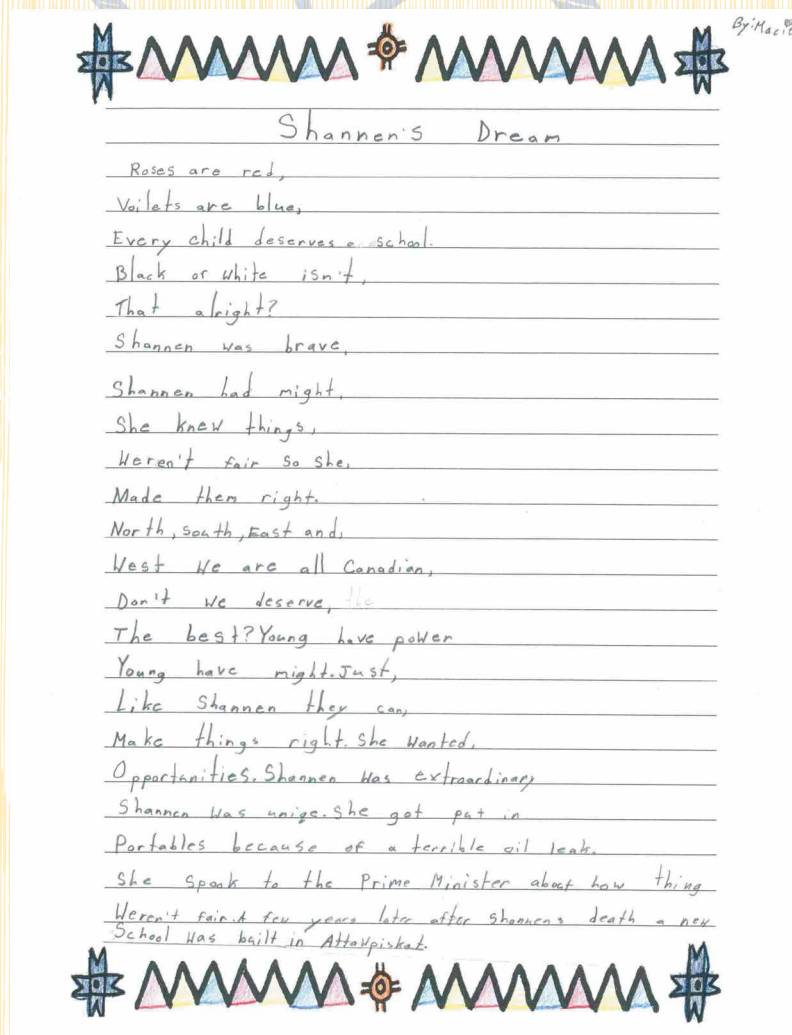
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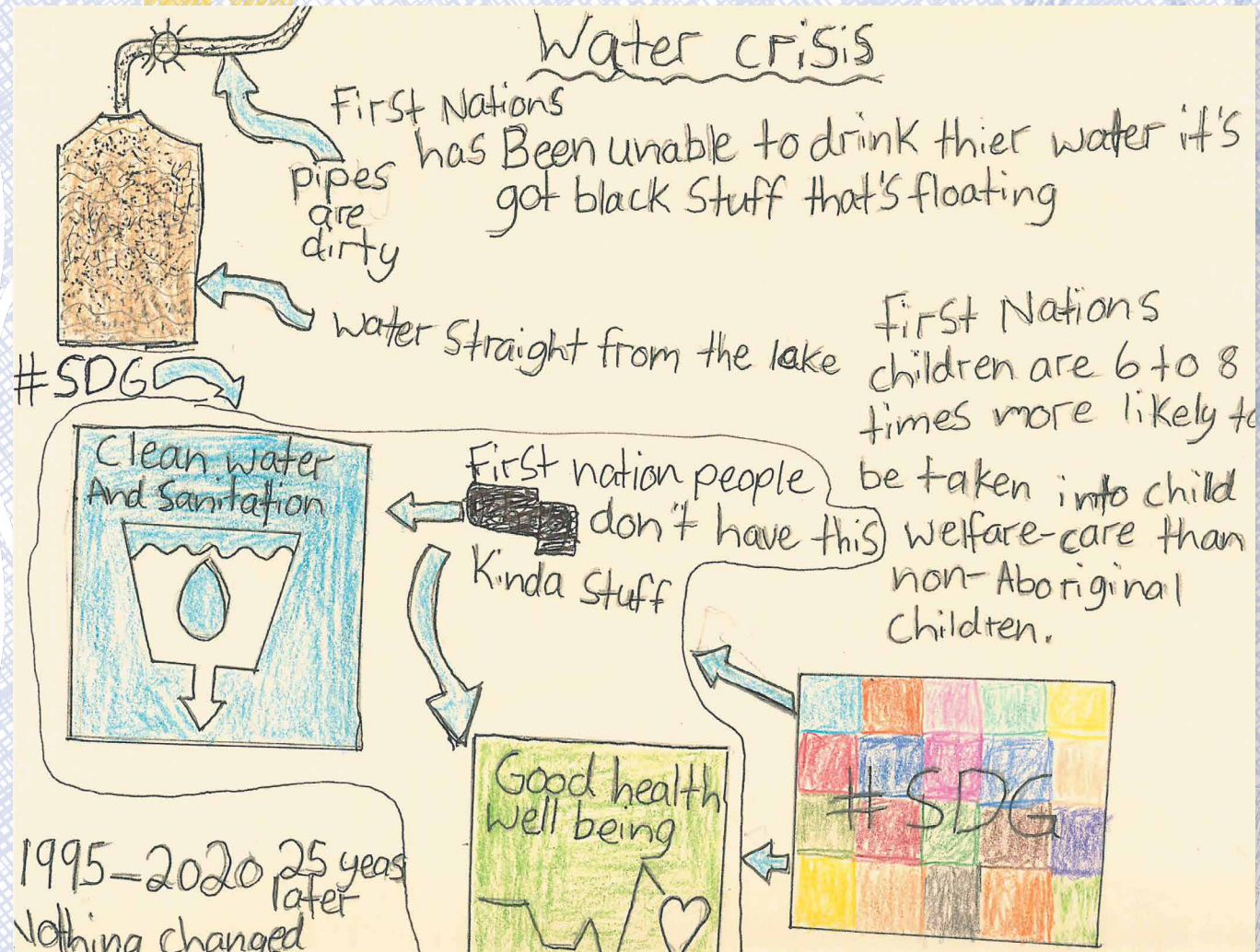

Attawapiskat is a cold place where you need to boil water to drink.

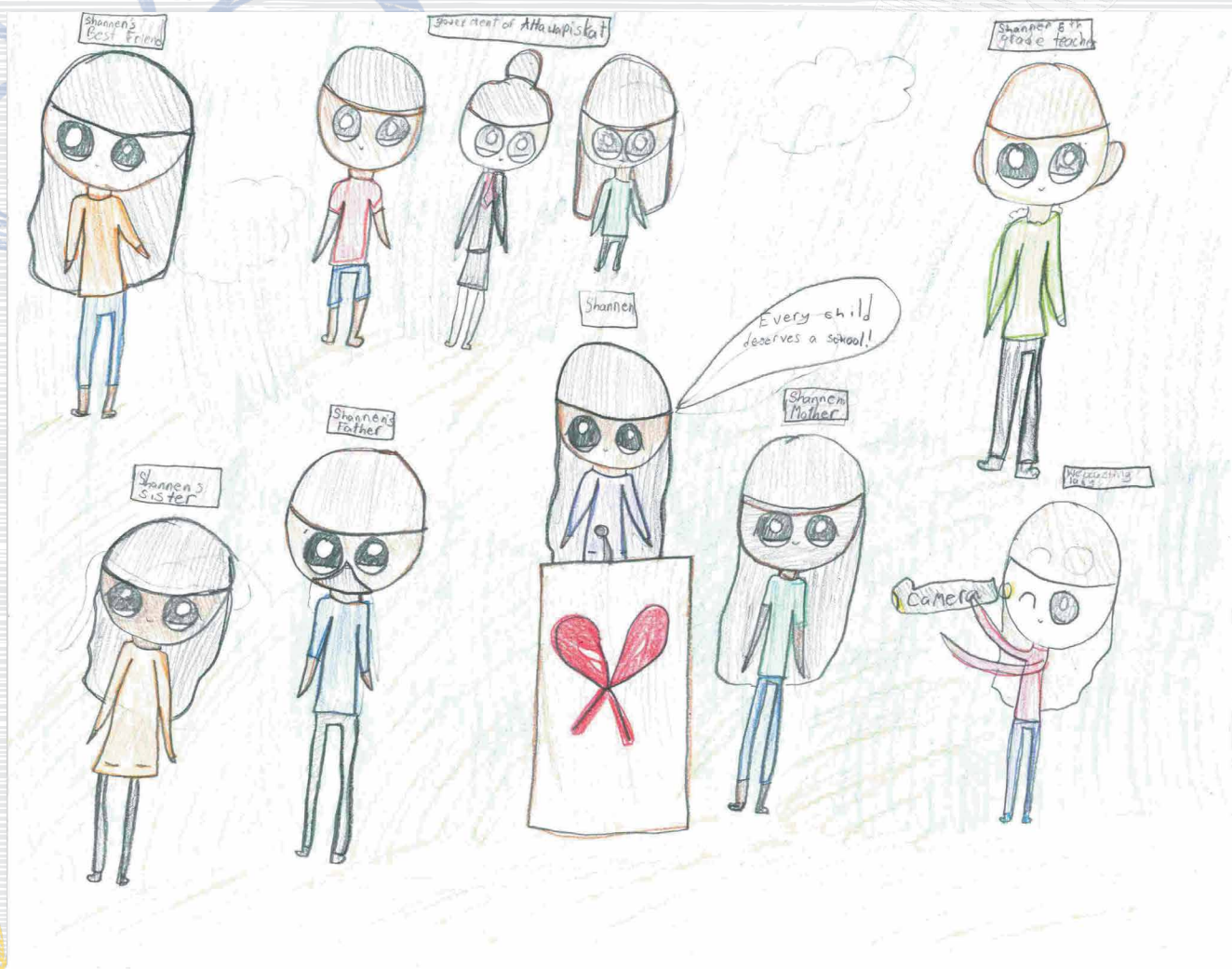
Maybe someday you can make your own dream come true, just like Shannen did!

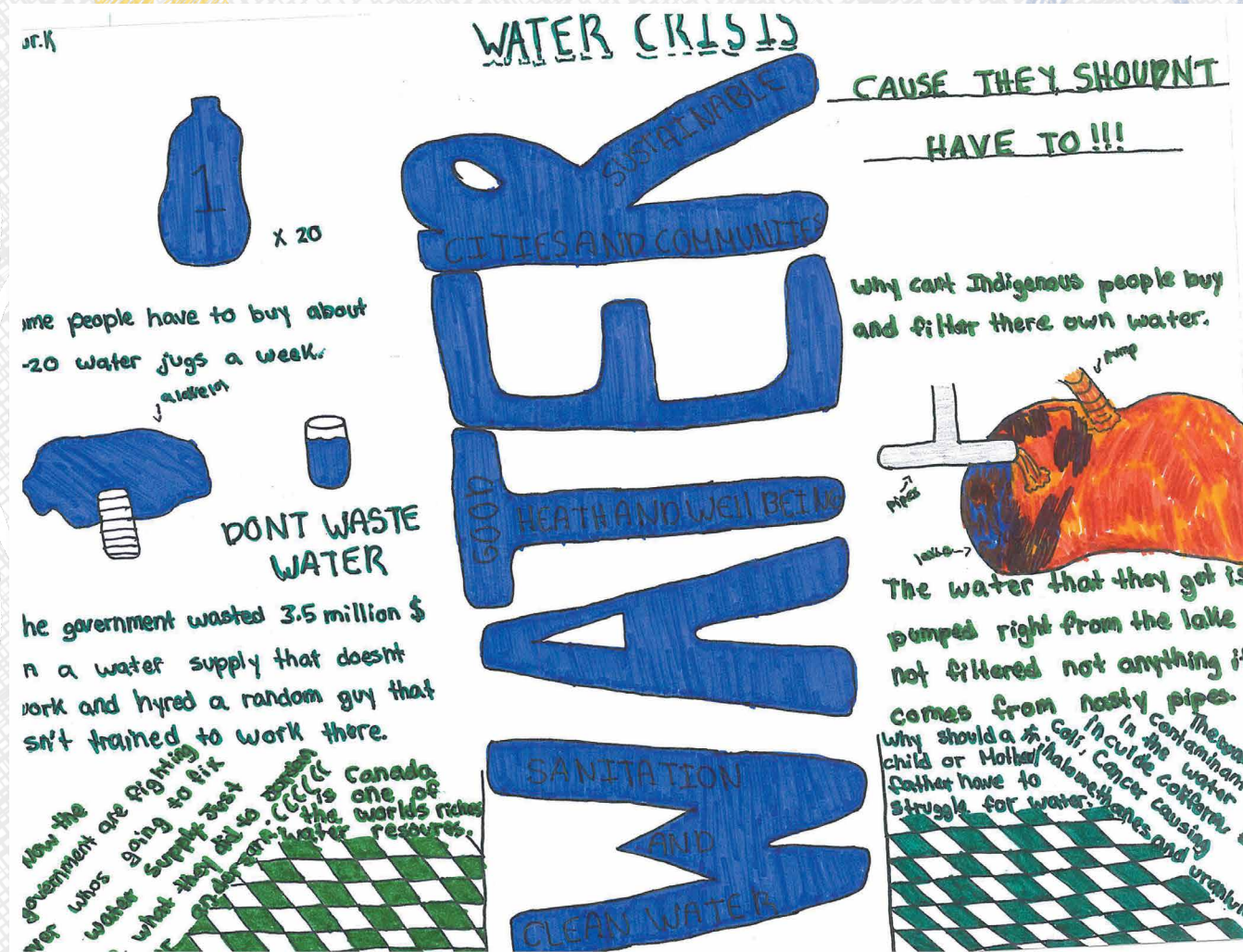

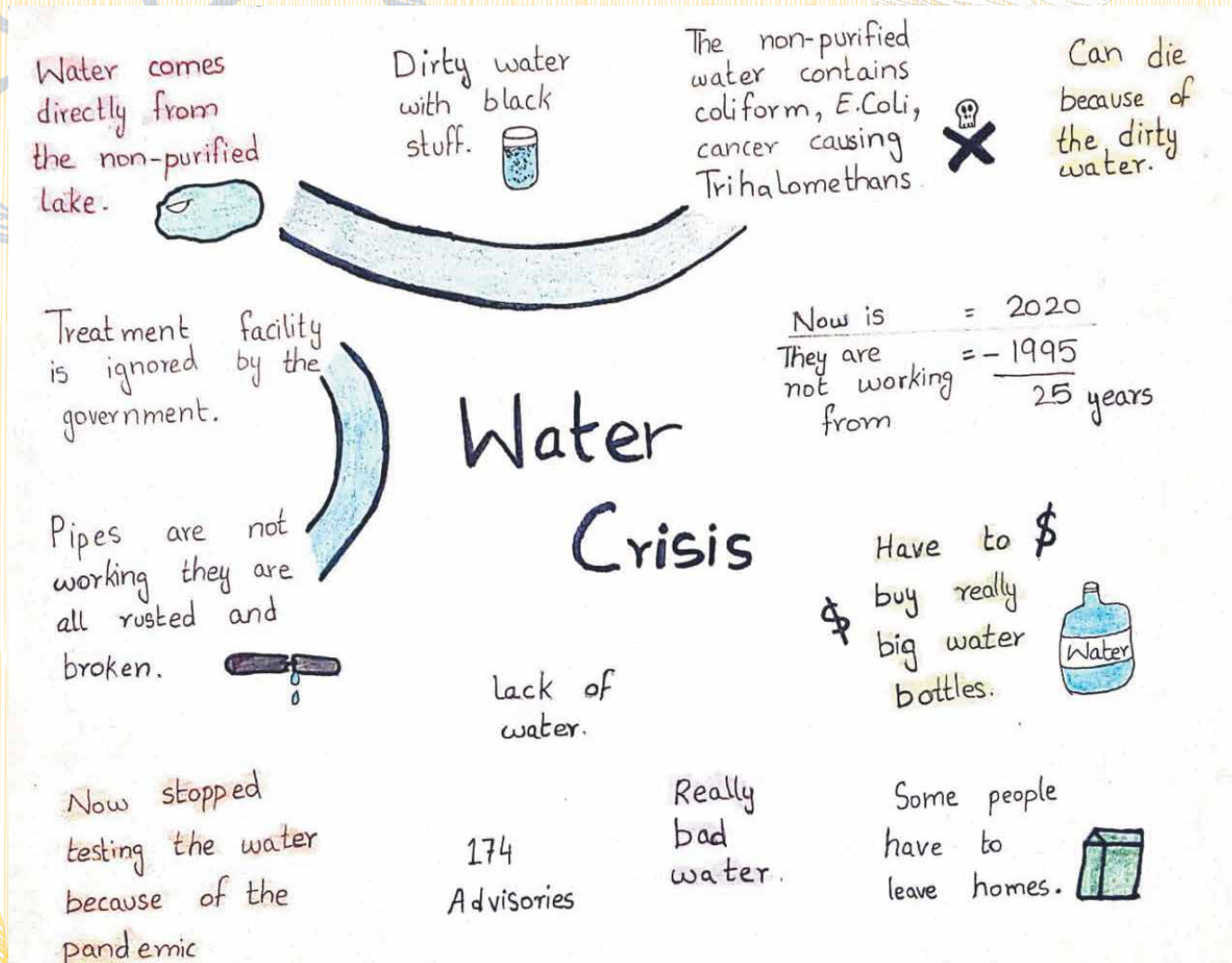


mean you can treat them like that.

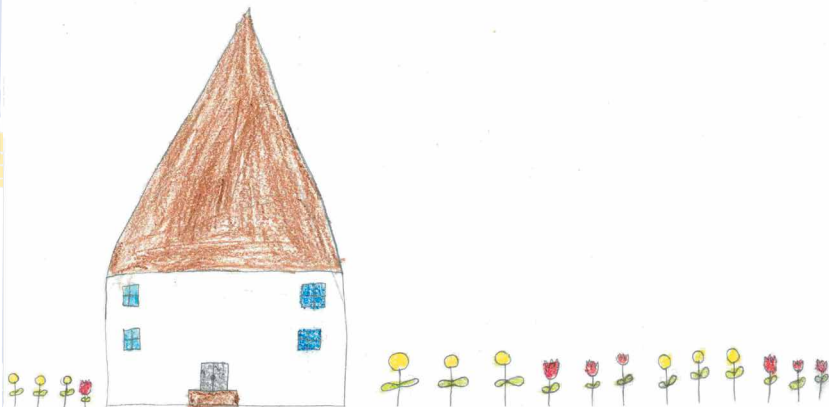

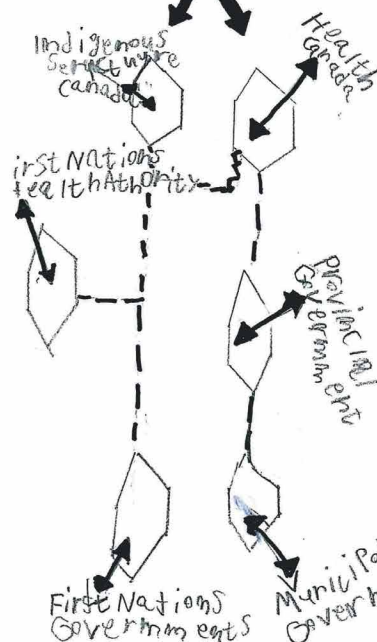

# Water Water Crisis in First Nations communities

Water governance structure



Some of the advisories date as far back as 1995 - like Shog Lake 40 First Nation.

43 per cent of first Nation water systems are at high or medium risk of contamination. In 2010, the United Nations declared water and sanitation human rights, acknowledging they are essential to the realization of all other rights.

In May 2012, there were 17 drinking water advisories in over 100 First Nations.

A single drinking water advisory can mean as many as 5,000 people access to safe, clean drinking water.

If Canada raises corporate tax rates from 15 to 25.5 percent, all First Nations could have working water systems.

imagine walking to school and not

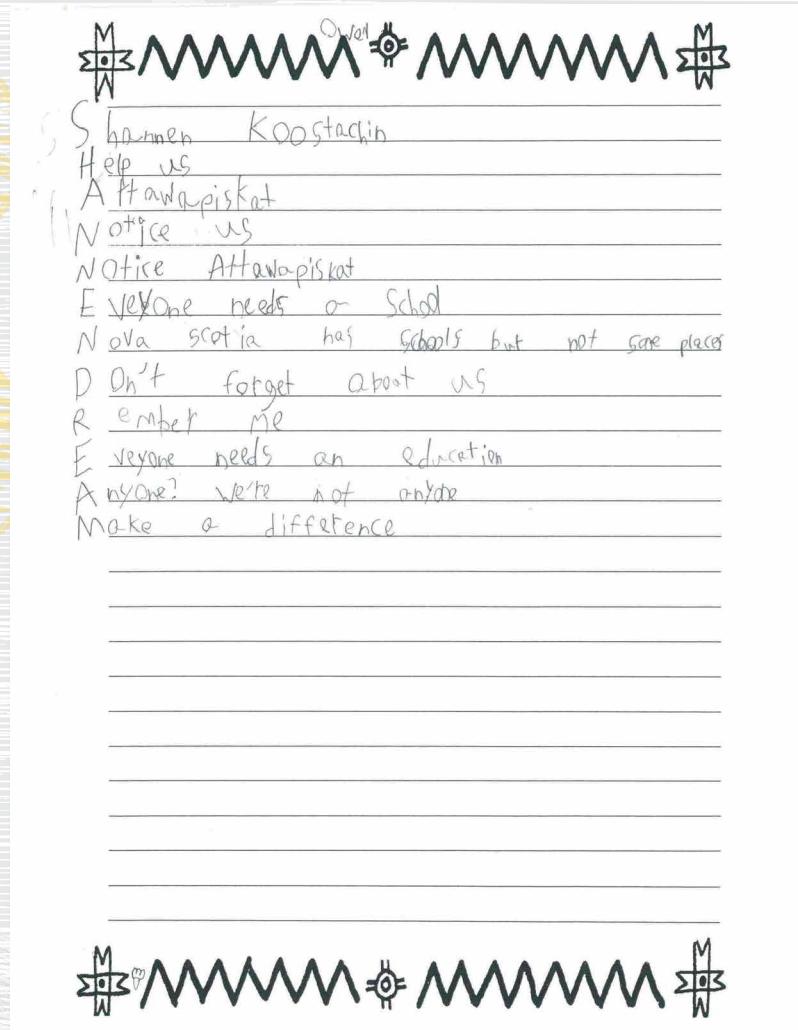
getting to go in a school building.

# WATER CRISIS IN FIRST NATION COMMUNITIES

- 870,000 people under a water crisis  
 $\frac{174 \text{ Advisories}}{\times 5000 \text{ people each}} = 870,000$

Some people get brown dirty water from their taps

Some people find unknown little black things in their water

The government provide a water treatment facility that costed 3.6 million but it didn't even work.

The council of Canadians learned that the federal government has

The water advisers started in 1995

2020 (this year)

This adviser is saying that the water is undrinkable

First nations shouldn't have to pay for water like other places in Canada. In order to drink safe water they use big jugs of water.

The water that First Nation Community gets is from the lake directly to their taps

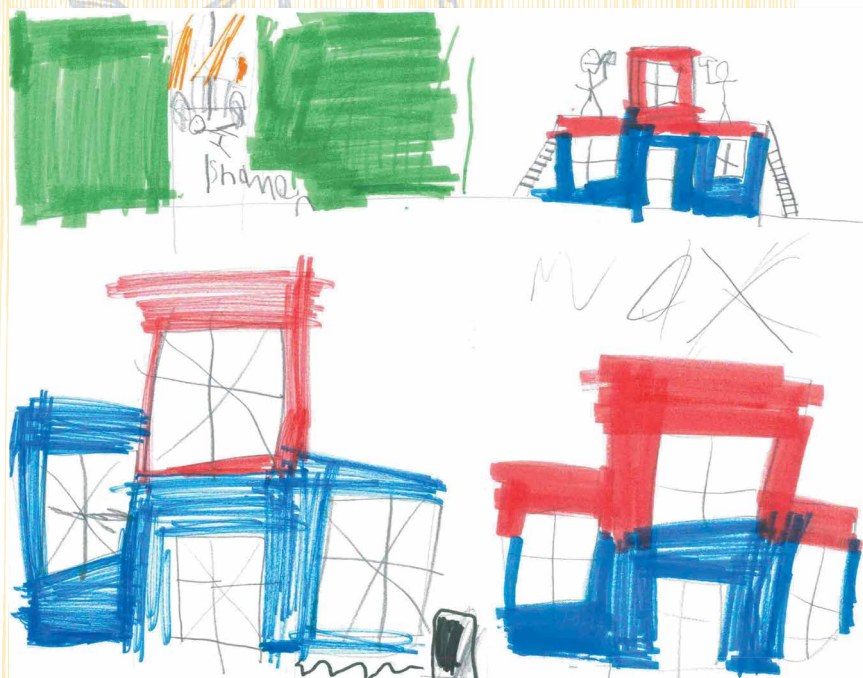

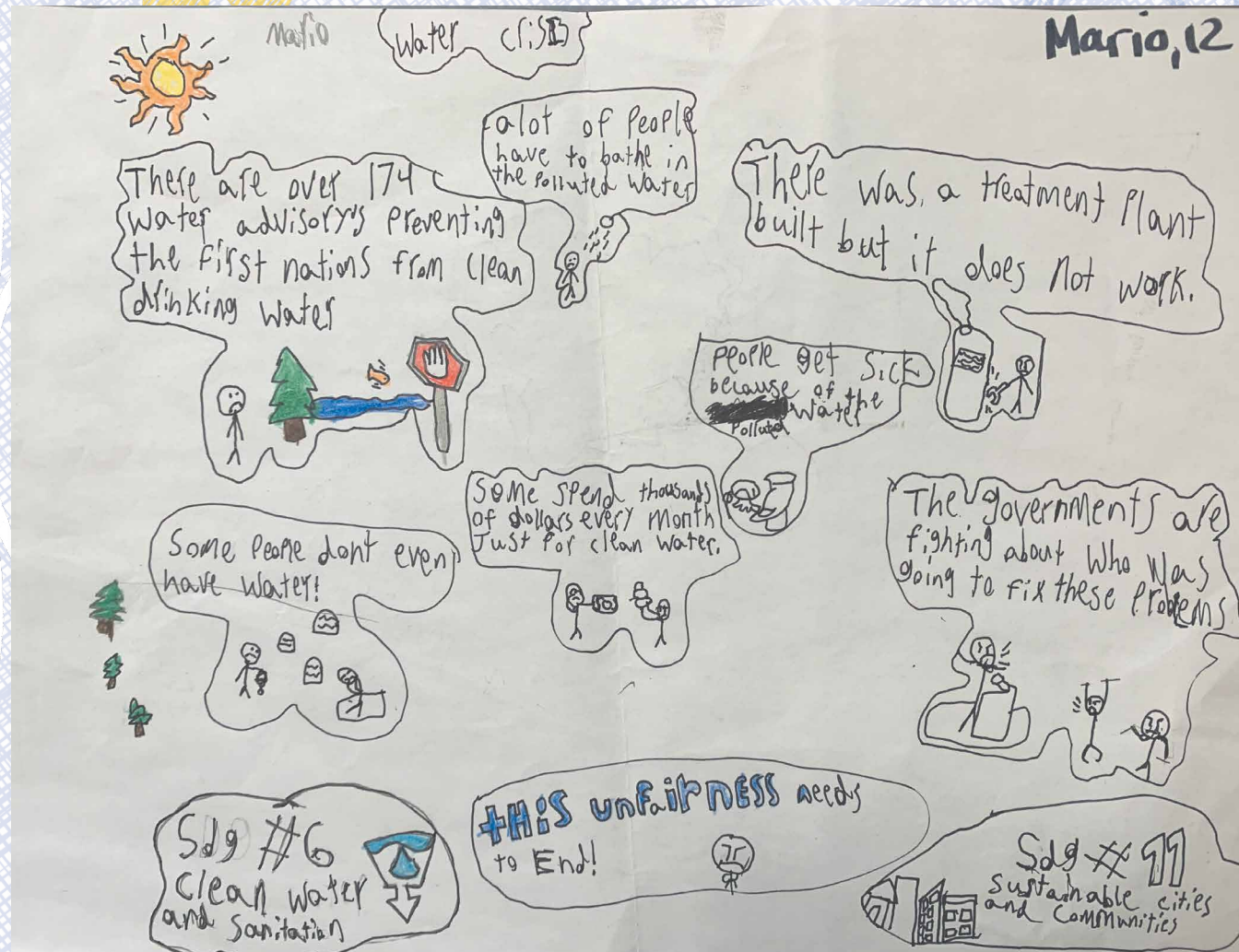

The water many Indigenous communities depend on is contaminated, difficult to access or risk due to faulty treatment system.

Contaminants: The contaminants in the water include Coliform, E.coli, and cancer causing Trihalomethanes.

Each water advisory, at least 5,000 people lack of access.





In 2018, there were 174 water advisories.

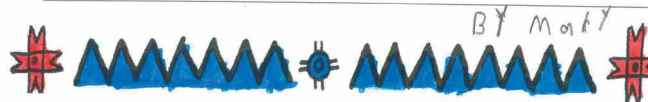

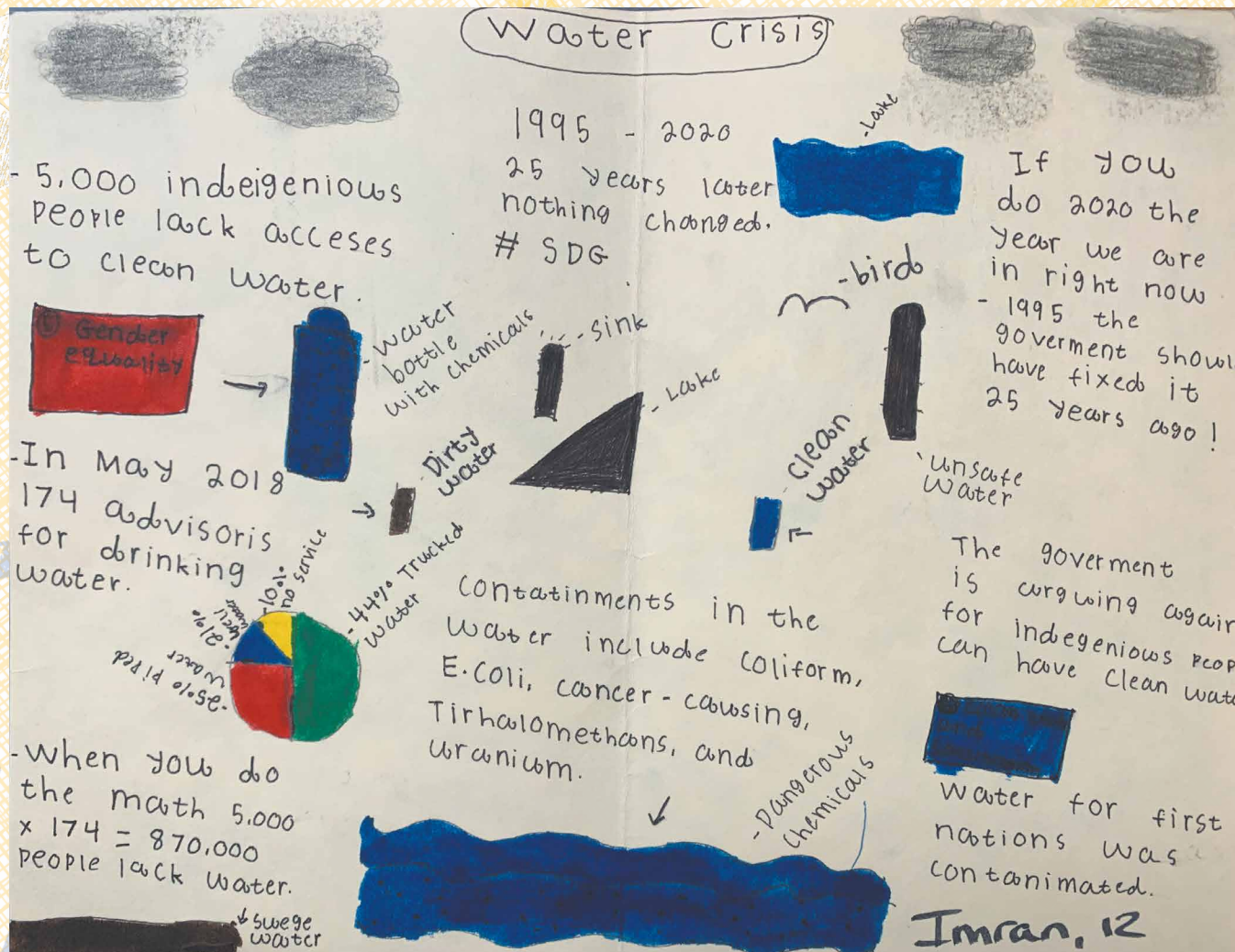
Roses are red, violets are blue.

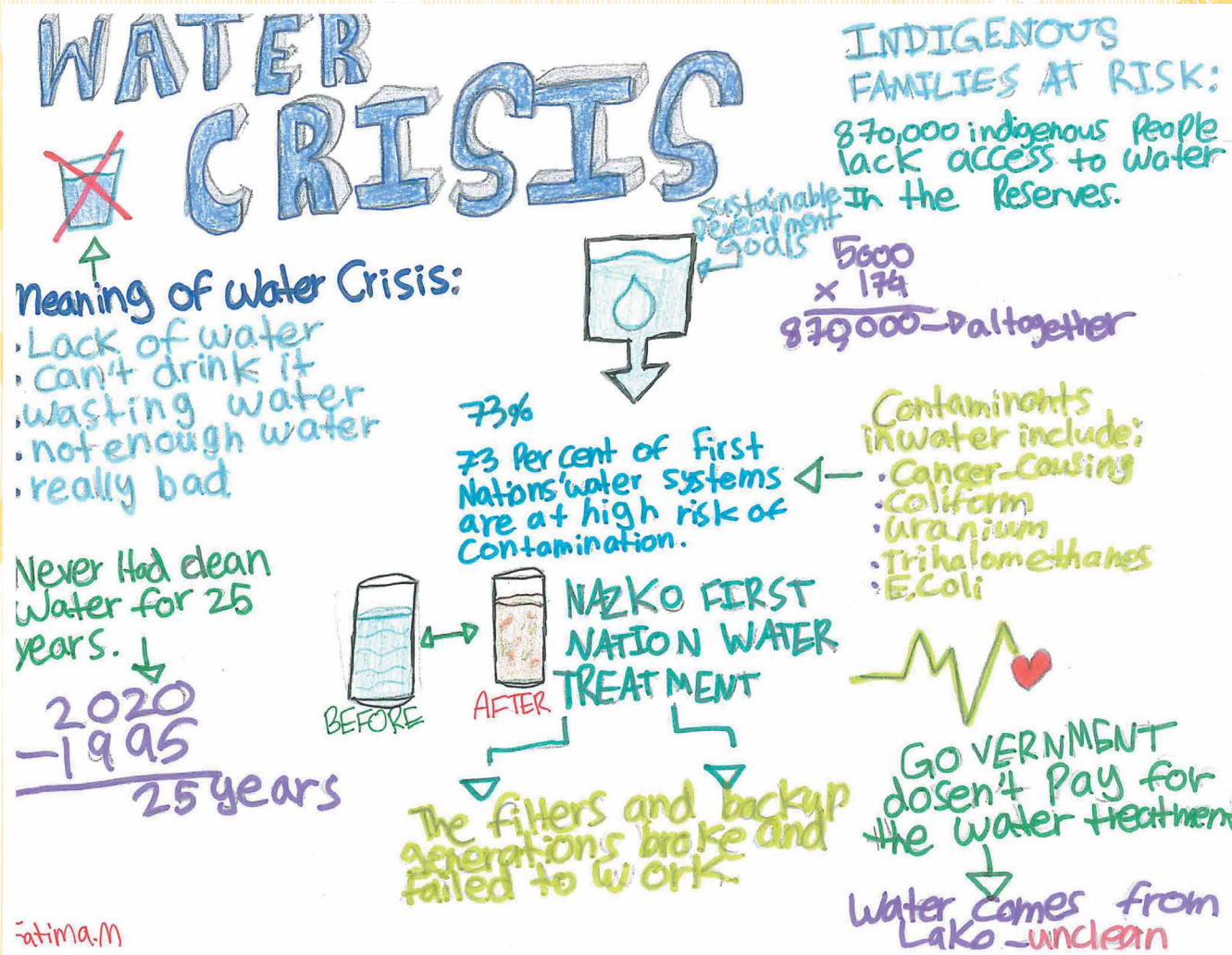

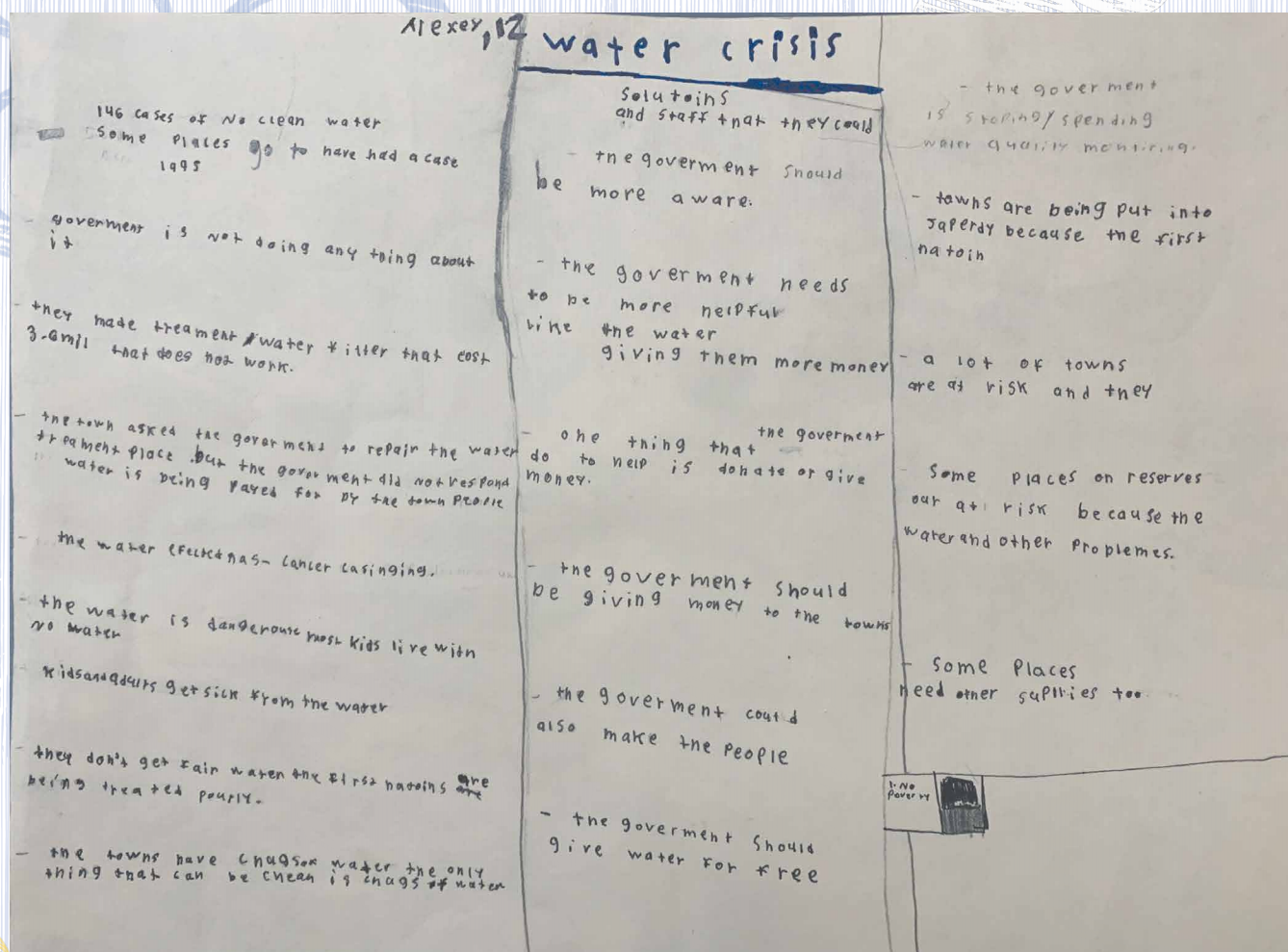

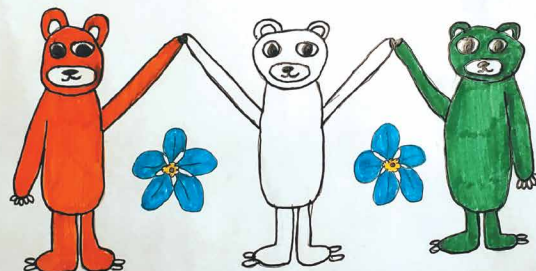
