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Now teaching at the History Department of the University of Alberta, **Olive Dickason** published *Indian Arts in Canada* (1972), as well as numerous articles, including those in *Plural Societies*, *Revue française d'histoire d'outre-mer*, and Parks Canada's History and Archaeology series.
