Their study showed that majority of students use AI technologies primarily for academic purposes, such as researching assignments and accessing clinical information. Students who participated in their study had a positive perception on the potential benefits of AI.

The second article by Alexandra Peters and Ann Schaeffer focuses on ways to improve hypertension management in rural Vermont using the American Heart Association Guidelines. The study implemented workflows to improve standardized blood pressure screening and increase the utilization of shared decision-making tools (SDMT). Their study showed that the SDMT improved patient awareness of lifestyle modifications. The third article by Cindy Ko explores how art can be incorporated into healthcare curriculum to enhance students' learning.
