Ruth Bleasdale is a doctoral candidate in history at the University of Western Ontario.

Larry Peterson works for Holt, Rinehart in New York and received a Columbia Ph.D. for his study of the KPD in the 1920s.

Gregory S. Kealey is currently enjoying St. John's, while on sabbatical from Dalhousie University.
