# DRENGSON, Alan (1934-2022)

With gratitude for a life consciously lived, we witnessed Alan's passage to another realm on March 6, 2022. He was a philosopher, a mountain climber, a lover of all things Norwegian, but above all, he was a dedicated father. We will laugh at his antics and stories for years to come. Alan dreamed large. He was a founder of the Environmental Studies program at the University of Victoria, British Columbia, Canada, the founder of the Ecoforestry Institute, and started two journals: *the Trumpeter: Journal of Ecosophy* and *Ecoforestry*. He taught at the University of Victoria for nearly fifty years, influencing countless students of philosophy and environmental studies. Alan is survived by his wife, Victoria Stevens, his 3 daughters, Alice (Mike), Jane (John), and Anna, his grandson, Finnegan, and his niece, Michelle Drengson. A memorial was held at Goward House on May 14, 2022 at 3:30 pm. In lieu of flowers, donations were sent to the Ecoforestry Institute Society and Habitat Acquisition Trust.
